Lev Vygotsky and Social Learning Theories Vygotsky scaffolding is part of the education concept "zone of proximal development" or ZPD. The ZPD is the set of

skills or knowledge a student can't do on her own but can do with the help or guidance of someone else. It's the skill level just above where the student currently is. ZPD is often depicted as a series of concentric circles.
